INTRODUCTION TO BIBLICAL HEBREW

Course Description .

This course is a continuation of HEB2A03 and is an introduction to more grammar, syntax and vocabulary of the language of the Hebrew Bible. There will be continued emphasis on morphology (words and their forms) and syntax (how words fit together to make coherent sentences). There will also be a strong emphasis on acquiring a broad vocabulary for continued reading in the Hebrew Bible. The knowledge acquired should enable the student to read the simple prose and poetry of the Hebrew Bible.

* N.B. The study of Hebrew is very challenging for most students but is very rewarding for those who persevere. You should plan on spending 1-3 hours *every day* preparing for and reviewing material covered in class.

Course Objectives .

Knowing .

- To memorize a solid beginner's vocabulary
- To know the basic forms of Hebrew words
- To know how to use grammars and dictionaries for studying biblical Hebrew

Being .

- The value of knowing the original language of the Old Testament gives access to in-depth research and exegesis of biblical texts
- The student's life will be enriched by the access to culture that knowledge of another language brings

Doing .

- In this course students will have begun to translate many texts directly from the Hebrew Scriptures
- Students will have built a foundation for a lifetime of fruitful engagement with the Hebrew Scriptures

Tuesday Vocab Quizzes .

At the beginning of class each Tuesday there will be a vocab quiz covering material up to and including the chapter covered in last class. These quizzes will simply ask for the English translation of up to 20 Hebrew words.

Thursday Grammar Tests .

At the beginning of each Thursday class there will be a grammar test covering material up to and including that covered in the previous class. These tests will include both grammar *and* vocabulary. They may include sentence translations, grammar explanations or diagramming, paradigms, and parsing etc.

Workbook Exercises .

Each chapter in the textbook has a corresponding chapter in the workbook. Once a chapter has been covered in class, students must then complete the corresponding workbook pages before the next class. The professor will periodically ask that workbook pages be turned in for marking. *Both the textbook and workbook must be brought to every class!*

Workbook exercises will be handed in for grading. The actual pages from the exercise book can be torn out (or photocopied) and stapled together to be submitted (in legible handwriting). At the top of the first page please be sure to write your name, the professor's name and the due date of the workbook sheets

Classroom Behaviour

Attendance .

- Students are expected to be on time to class or ready to give an explanation for their tardiness to the professor.
- Students are also expected to stay for the entire class session, unless arranged in advance with the professor.

Participation .

- Students are not to carry on off-topic conversations in class.
