1. Description of Topic and Its Importance: This section will describe the proposed research field and its importance, set in the context of the history of research. This section must end with a clear thesis statement (to be included on the cover sheet as well) for your project which sets out in brief form the precise proposition or hypothesis that your project will seek to demonstrate and the original contribution your project will make to the research field.

2. Research Methodology/Model/Framework: This section will provide the research methodology, investigative model, and/or theoretical framework for the dissertation, describing the past development of this methodology/model/framework, the importance of this methodology/model/ framework to the particular research field and the usefulness of the methodology/model/ framework for generating and verifying the conclusions reached in the dissertation.
3. Outline/Structure of the Dissertation: This section will provide an account of the projected organization of the dissertation with a description of each section (chapter). The relationship between the sections should be described as well.
4. Work Plan/Timeline: This section will provide a concise description of the proposed procedure for the development of your dissertation with a preliminary schedule for research and writing. This usually does not follow the outline of the dissertation, but rather the proposed order of research.
5. Preliminary Bibliography: This section comprises 20-30 sources directly relevant to the dissertation. A thorough and standard academic citation style should be followed.

N.B. The proposal is to follow the conventions of academic writing, that is, appropriate layout, documentation and flow of argument. The normal length will be 1,500 - 3,000 words.
